Rugging


Measuring & Fitting

The main points to remember when choosing a rug are that the length, depth and shape are correct for your horse. A rug is measured by its length, which is taken from the point at the wither to the edge of the rug near the tail. The sides of the rug should be long enough to ensure that none of the horse's belly shows underneath. The front of the rug should close neatly across the chest without pulling. Rugs are fitted with leg straps and sometimes a single or double surcingle to hold them in place. The straps should be kept soft and supple to prevent chafing and should be threaded through

each other when the rug is on the horse. Leg straps should be adjusted so that they hold the rug in place without being too loose otherwise a leg could become caught up if the horse rolls. Surcingles are attached to or slotted through slits in the sides of the rug.

<u>Hygiene</u>

Rugs should be brushed with a heavy brush or broom (like an outdoor broom) to remove excessive collection of hair and mud/dirt in order to prevent rubbing on the horses skin or transfer of parasites from one horse to another. It's a good idea to have an under cover area where rugs can be hung to dry and/or air. With winter coming up, don't wait to the first cold day to check the condition of your horse's rug—get out there before that first cold day or night to check your horse rugs and if necessary clean and repair them before you need them. Your horse will appreciate your efforts!




To clip or not to clip


One of the reasons for clipping is to avoid excess sweating and subsequent loss of condition, another purpose is to aid the comfort of the horse during the winter months. The longer and coarser winter coat usually starts to grow in Autumn. This increase insulation causes the horse to sweat more during work, which if not dried off may cause chills. A clipped horse is also easier to groom.

The more hair that is removed the less tolerant the horse will be to the cold and wet. So the hunter clip (see far bottom right) is only suitable for horses kept stabled at all times and that are rugged throughout the winter. The blanket clip (middle right) leaves more hair on the horses back to provide a little more protection for the kidney and rump areas.

The trace clip (top right) leaves most of the exposed areas of the horse unclipped and is suitable for horses turned out during the day and stabled at night. The trace clip only involves removing the hair from the "midriff" area of the horse, which are the areas most prone to the accumulation of sweat.

If you do decide to clip your horse for winter, you will need to be diligent with your rugging regime. Would you like to be out in the paddock only half dressed on a windy Wamboin day! So think carefully about any decision to clip your horse. If in doubt, ask any of the Club Instructors for more information.
